Reflections on the "table of contents" component

- My anthology will be composed of three sections. The first is one that I call a journey through time which will explore time travel. The
 second I call a journey through space which will be about space travel. The last is called a journey to oneself which will deal with
 discovery of oneself. Each of these sections will have different texts, like news paper articles, book reviews, chapter excerpts and
 scholarly articles.
- Making my table of contents wasn't as easy as I thought it would be. After gathering all the texts you want to be a part of your anthology you have to come up with different sections to place them in. The hard part is placing the articles where you think they fit best. My first section ended up being "Indecision." My first article in this section is "Indecisiveness" by Sukanya Ray. - I played around on blackboard (where my anthology is posted) until I could figure out how to get the links up and running. I figured out how to get a link turned into a hyperlink which was very helpful because it makes it easier for the reader to just simply click on the link and it would take them directly to that webpage.

Reflections on the "own essays" component

- The essay I wrote myself is named "What do I want to be when I grow up?" I chose to place it under the third
 section in my TOC because its an example of someone who is indecisive, in this case myself, and the whole
 point of this third section is for readers to see examples of people who have gone through indecision or are
 going through it now.

- I had eight weeks to work on the anthology and each week I got more research done, and eventually started working on my own essay.
- For the past few years it's been a little hard for me to speak about what I've been through. It was pretty hard for me to talk about my life to anyone without bursting into tears. It was quite therapeutic for me to put my feelings on paper, but to also read about others who have encountered similar situations that I have.

Reflections on the "participation" component

- Week three was the first time we split up into our editorial committees. In this week we had to write a letter informing our committee members about our topic and what help we could use from them. We also greeted them. The following week is when we did research for them based upon what we read in their letters. I looked up what each member asked for about their topic. - I hope that when you read this anthology you will see my main point which is even though comedians are funny and entertaining they do have a softer side that we do not normally see and these excerpts will give you that insight and will hopefully change your perception of these comedians just how it changed mine. I would also like to thank my group members Oliver, Danny, Shalanna, and Natalie for helping me find texts and for also giving me a sense of direction in where I should go with my anthology. I liked the fact that we were able to work as a team because without their help, I do not think I was able to complete my anthology and I do not think that they would have been able to complete their anthology as well if we did not work together on this.

Reflections on their "broad range of exploratory reading" component

- There are endless amounts of writing about gymnastics; the only thing was that it was hard to find the things that I wanted. This had helped me out a lot for the reason that I was able to weed out the good from the bad and the truth from the dishonest articles. The only thing I didn't want to do was read a long and boring text which I would lose interest in after the first page. So I chose to put in graphs and videos because some people get the message better through visual aid than those that can read and fully comprehend what they are reading
- I found a very interesting scholarly article while doing my research. It had to do with holding foster care agencies responsible for the abuse and neglect that foster children encounter. The article speaks of 8-year-old Marcus Smith who has to wear a helmet to protect his head after having his skull smashed in by a teenage son of his foster mother. He has a permanent plate in his head and was left with permanent damage to his brain, leaving him with special needs. After this story came to light it became apparent to many that foster agencies weren't doing their job in protecting foster children.
- In the process of looking for text as well, I was both very touched and heartbroken by some of the stories I came across. They showed me that not only have many people been through some of the same situations as I have, but there are a lot of others who have been through far worse than I have. These really brought me to a humble place and showed me to always appreciate the blessings you've been given in life.

Reading Like Writer, or, Audience-Oriented Reading

- For that reason alone, I found myself researching texts everybody can relate to and made sure there were many visuals. For instance, the text of famous celebrities with cancer was added in for readers to recognize and make connections with figures they see and hear about on their televisions. It is very easy to find scientific lectures that speak in-depth about cancer, but will the everyday reader leave with information they can use in their lives? In my opinion, no, and that is exactly why my anthology is formatted the way it is. Many find it easy to soak in information with a diagram/visual of some sort, which is why you will also find a handful of educational videos.
- I also spent quite some time picking which articles I thought gave diverse and detailed information about death. A lot of times I ended up removing most of my articles and replacing them with others.
- The one problem I had when I was searching for articles on my topic, I was running into a lot of forum websites, where someone would ask a question on the internet and random people answer them. I wasn't able to include those in the anthology because they aren't official articles written by a professor or by an actual worker in the field. After doing enough research though I finally found legit articles and videos written and filmed by professionals.
- The reason why I picked this text was because I want my classmates or other people that will be reading this essay, to be aware of the anti Semitism that not only is taking place in Europe, but in many other countries too. When I was choosing this video, I was hesitant at first because I did not want anyone to get offended by it if they had different thoughts than I did about this topic.
- This process of creating an anthology was very interesting to me yet it was very frustrating. It was frustrating in terms of where to find texts that comedians have written. The reason why this was hard was because even though some of these comedians have written quite a few books so there was no way that I was able to include an entire book into my anthology, and second it was difficult to find an excerpt of a book that really showcased (highlighted) the author's (comedian's) style of writing while at the same time showing some of their humor...Even though the excerpts in the anthology are not too long it gives you a good sense of how these comedians write and their sense of humor.
- Lastly I have "Why It's ok to be Lost And Confused" by a writer named Therese. I choose this to end my
 anthology because Therese really inspired me. She seems to have been in the same position as me, not
 knowing what she wanted to do in life. Therese was lost and confused just like I am now. Her story actually
 makes me feel like being indecisive may not be a bad thing after all.
